In the 1950s, a series of dams was proposed along the Brazos River in north-central Texas. For John Graves, this project meant that if the stream’s regimen was thus changed, the beautiful and sometimes brutal surrounding countryside would also change, as would the lives of the people whose rugged ancestors had eked out an existence there. In all of Foote’s writing, he reveals the immense drama behind quiet lives, or as Frank Rich has said, “the unbearable turbulence beneath a tranquil surface.” Farewell is as deeply moving as the best of Foote’s writing for film and theater, and a gorgeous testimony to his own faith in the human spirit.
